**CALL FOR APPLICATION FOR CONSULTANCY SERVICES FOR  
Mid-term external evaluation of the project “ FOSTERING HEALTH AND  
PROTECTION TO VULNERABLE MIGRANTS TRANSITING THROUGH  
MOROCCO, TUNISIA, EGYPT, LIBYA AND YEMEN”**

**Commissioned by IOM Morocco**

**1. Evaluation context**

Established in 1951, the International Organization for Migration (IOM) is the UN Migration Agency. The health promotion and assistance for migrants programme area caters its strategy and activities to the needs of migrant populations and the changing requirements of Member States to address the health of migrants. IOM projects in this area provide **access to high-quality health services for migrants**, and undertake substantial amount of operational research to **promote evidence-based migration health policies**.

Based on the experience of the previous project “Promoting health and wellbeing among migrants in Morocco, Egypt, Libya, Tunisia and Yemen,” funded by the Ministry of Foreign Affairs of Finland, IOM is implementing the second phase that aim is to continue to support and fill the gaps of the national and local actors of Morocco, Tunisia, Egypt, Libya and Yemen in migration management with a focus on improving health and protection to vulnerable migrants regionally. More specifically, the project in the five countries is implementing a set of tailored activities to support governments and to assist vulnerable migrants and respond to their health rights and protection needs. This is achieved through the below interdependent outcomes:

1. Migration-sensitive policy that promotes health and protection needs of migrants in the participating countries, and supporting the operationalization of relevant national policies, where applicable.
2. Improved access and continuity to essential health and protection services for the most vulnerable migrants including victims of trafficking (VoTs), victims of sexual and gender-based violence (SGBV) and unaccompanied and separated children (UASCs), where there is still a need.



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3. Strengthened capacity of government and CSO stakeholders to effectively promote the health and protection needs of vulnerable migrants including VoTs, victims of SGBV and UASCs and in communities affected by migration crises.
4. Improved multispectral collaboration at regional and national level to leverage national and international public health interventions targeting improved health and protection for vulnerable migrants and migration affected communities.

## 3. Required Qualifications and Experience

The lead evaluator is expected to have the following minimum qualifications and experience:

- Minimum master's degree in social research and/or evaluation methods, social science, Development studies, Public Health or Epidemiology.
- Minimum of 7 years of experience in managing and/or evaluating development projects/programmes/initiatives;
- Proven experience evaluating project addressing public health issues is an advantage
- Demonstrated experience and familiarity with migration dynamics and demonstrated knowledge of Middle East and North Africa (MENA) context particularly related to trans-national organized crime such as trafficking in human beings and migrants' smuggling as well as labour migration in MENA.
- Fluency in English and French is required, working knowledge of Arabic is an advantage.

## 4. Other requirements

A mixed method approach will be used with qualitative and quantitative evaluation techniques. These will be comprised of:

- A documentation review: IOM Morocco, Tunisia, Egypt, Yemen and Libya will be responsible for providing the necessary documentation, including activity and project reports, M&E tools, financial data, correspondence, specific agreements and/or sub-agreements, technical documentation reports, together with any other



documentation that IOM (in each implementing country) considers important for the evaluation exercise,

- A series of interviews with beneficiaries, implementing partners, affected and interested stakeholders as well as project management team in all implementing missions and other key staff in the implementation of the project as the evaluator deem necessary.

The Evaluator will be expected to develop a more detailed evaluation methodology to meet expectations in line with the overall purpose.

Finally, the evaluator must follow the IOM Data Protection Principles, UNEG norms and standards for evaluation, and relevant ethical guidelines.

#### 5. Time frame

The evaluation is expected to cover the entire project implementation 1 Feb 2018 until 28 Feb 2019 being the projects' phase II mid-term (12 months). The evaluation is expected to cover the five implementing missions including field visits to Morocco, Yemen, Libya, Tunisia and Egypt. The final list of countries to be visited will be agreed upon with the project coordinator during the inception process.

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## **6. Submission of application/expression of interest**

The interested candidates are expected to submit a technical and financial proposal with all-inclusive itemized budget and the CV of the individual evaluator (in case of individual consultancy) or the CVs of the team leader and key evaluation team members (in case of a consultancy firm) cover letter as well as their recent evaluation report example. The proposal must provide details on the methodology and approach to the assignment.
